## REVIEW OF TRAILS AND ROUTES

### Joint response of the Peak District National Park Authority and Peak District Local Access Forum

#### Q1. The Best Trails and Routes

The findings of the review suggest that national standards should be set for routes other than National Trails.

- a. How useful do you think highway authorities would find this?

Potentially useful for areas without any National Trails – invites highway authorities to give greater publicity and promotion to their best waymarked routes. But if these national standards are to require better route maintenance, waymarking, promotion, and so on, adequate resources **MUST** be forthcoming so that other routine rights of way spending doesn't suffer as a result. We must avoid ending up with a tiered system where the network as a whole suffers because resources are channelled into a handful of elite local trails.

If a route is not promoted and managed by a local authority there must at least be an agreement with or acknowledgement by the highway authority of its responsibilities to 'service' a defined, high-standard route. However, there are several examples where independent user groups (eg South West Coast Path Assoc, Offa's Dyke Assoc) already play an important role in the wider management of individual routes and this should be encouraged so more people are involved and pressure on central funding may be relieved.

The review found that little data is collected on how routes, other than National Trails, are managed and used, or on their financial costs and benefits.

Local authorities need to be more open and welcoming, as well as explain trail management more effectively to the 'layman'. People (volunteers) need to be allowed and encouraged to get a sense of 'ownership' of their local routes, perhaps going so far as to include them in some sort of decision making/monitoring process – or setting up trail advisory or liaison groups.

**Q6. Trails and Routes Staff**

The review found that the expertise held within National Trail teams and local authority staff is not being shared. Natural England is keen to ensure that expertise is shared between all people managing routes.
