

# A guide to becoming an Ambassador School

Use this guide to help complete your application form. It will help you identify where your school could benefit from the National Park resources that are available and link your activity with the National Park.

Consider your school's outdoor learning activity across the year groups and how it connects to nature and to the Peak District National Park.

#### Top activities

- Learn more about the special qualities of the Peak District National Park and identify the special qualities of your wild place/school grounds
- Undertake a John Muir Award based on the Peak District National Park (KS2 and above).
- Visit the Peak District National Park on a day or residential visit.
- A visit to your school from a Peak District Ranger
- Raise funds for the Peak District National Park Foundation.
- Build on your existing outdoor activities e.g. outdoor learning, forest schools, litter picking, learning about National Parks.

As outdoor interest grows through the school, we hope new generations of young people will benefit from a connection to the natural wonders and cultural heritage of the Peak District National Park, as well as the wild places in the school's area.

#### Advice and support from the Peak District National Park Team

Once you have submitted the online application form, a member of the National Park education team will call you to discuss your application. Schools are selected based on their application and this call.

**Please note:** Responsibility lies with the school for ensuring adequate health and safety, legal and insurance arrangements for activities towards achieving a John Muir Award or Ambassador School status. All activities provided by the Peak District National Park will have their own risk assessments done and the National Park instructors will be suitably trained.

#### **Special Qualities Learning Grid**

The learning grid highlights where aspects of the curriculum and the Special Qualities of the Peak District National Park can fit together. It also highlights what resources are available to support schools. It will help you identify "actions your school could do or may already be doing to be an Ambassador School".

The Peak District National Park has seven defined special qualities – these aspects are what makes the place unique and different from other landscapes. We have provided two wordings for the special qualities. One is aimed at adults and older students the other for younger audiences.

### Wider educational and curriculum links

**Cultural capital** – National Parks are key part of our nation's natural cultural capital. National Parks showcase some of the best landscapes our country has to offer. They are protected under laws that were campaigned for by hard working people. In the UK, we have a wealth of cultural capital that National Parks look after and care for.

**British values** – 'Personal responsibility and liberty', e.g. following the Countryside Code and right to roam. 'Democracy', e.g. Kinder Mass trespass of 1932.

**Global goals** – The United Nations' 17 global goals for sustainable development: global goal 3 good health and well-being, global goal 6 clean water and sanitation, global goal 13 climate change, global goal 14 life below water, global goal 15 life on land.
