Learning objective

To understand rights and responsibilities on individuals and communities in relation to the rural environment in England.

Overview

This lesson will provide the opportunity for pupils to explore the rights and responsibilities around access and enjoyment of the English countryside. Understanding key terms such as rural, urban and access.

The green spaces in our urban and rural areas are important for enjoyment, wellbeing and connection to nature but these interests can come in to conflict with protecting the natural environment and people who live and work in these areas. This lesson provides a range of sources on the Countryside Code for pupils to review and debate. Once the presentation is complete you can choose from a practical art/literacy based activity to develop campaign posters for the Countryside Code, you may choose to complete these over multiple sessions. Alternatively, you could split the class in to groups to discuss the Countryside Code and think about whether they would change or add to it, encouraging discussion and observation.

Your class maybe unaware of The Countryside Code. It's not something that's talked about much anymore but in recent years has been increasingly in the news in different ways. Many young people will have an understanding of good behaviour in the outdoors e.g. not littering, but many may have little understanding of the other ways we can look after the countryside.

• Ask the class what rules they might expect to see on the Countryside Code?

Is the Countryside Code still important? Is it just about picking up our litter when we're outside? The short video clip from Newsround talks about the links between the Countryside Code and protecting the environment for future generations, links with climate change and links with our wellbeing.

The two images from BBC News, show the negatives side of access, behaviours that cause damage to our environment.

Image 1 (BBC News) – A wildfire at Rushup Edge in the Peak District National Park. This fire was started by someone cooking on the edge of a footpath. The fire was put out by the fire service, National Park rangers and landowners. BBQs and campfire cooking are potential cause of wildfires and there is a growing campaign to ban the sale of disposable BBQs within the Peak District National Park.

Image 2 (BBC News) – An image of litter in Dovedale in the Peak District National Park. This was a very common site across many popular rural locations and urban parks during the COVID-19 pandemic as more people accessed green space for daily exercise and other indoor activities were closed. Littering continues to be a big problem costing time and money to clean up and the issues it causes for wildlife both on land and in the water.

The Countryside Code

The Countryside Code was first created in the 1930's and was called the country code. It is a set of rules for visitors to rural and especially agricultural areas of England. The Countryside Code is still important today and in 2020 the government updated the code to make it more suitable for today's visitors. During the COVID-19 pandemic this helped manage the increased number of people accessing the countryside.

Is the Countryside Code still important?

As more people want to access the countryside for enjoyment, wellbeing and connectio with nature it's important we continue to balance visiting with looking after the

The Countryside Code in use

The Countryside Code has been around for 70 years and it has been updated a number of times. Most recently in 2020 some changes were made and it was republished in the light of increased access during the COVID–19 pandemic. The Countryside Code sets out some guidance around three themes Respect, Protect and Enjoy. It also shows information on following signs and understanding our rights of way network. Some of this information is about looking after the environment, others about keeping visitors safe and some about local people's livelihoods.

Peak District Proud is a local version of the Countryside Code. This was created in 2019 and shows how you can take the messages of the Countryside Code and create a local campaign around important issues.

There have also been animations of the Countryside Code made to highlight the messages for younger audiences.

YouTube film one is a Creature Comforts Countryside Code made by the Department of Farming and Rural Affairs in 2004. This is a fun clip to bring the Countryside Code messages a wider audience.

YouTube film two is a Peak District National Park animation 'Do This'. The animation is a fun interpretation of the Countryside Code aimed at encouraging people to do the right thing rather than saying what not to do.

• The video clips are very short and both have slightly different messages within them. Using the worksheet below watch each video a couple of times and ask the pupils to identify the Countryside Code messages in the films. Are they the same? Why might they be different? What are the good and bad points of the films?
